WOMEN OF COLOR IN ELECTIVE OFFICE 2007* CONGRESS, STATEWIDE, STATE LEGISLATURE

CONGRESSWOMEN -20 (19D, 1R)

Of the **86** women serving in the 110th U.S. Congress, **20**, or **23.3%**, are women of color, all serving in the House; in addition, an African American woman and a Caribbean American woman serve as Delegates to the House from Washington, DC and the Virgin Islands, respectively. Women of color constitute 3.7% of the total 535 members of Congress. No women of color serve in the U.S. Senate.

STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVES -4 (3D, 1NP**)

Of the **76** women serving in statewide elective executive offices, **4**, or **5.3**%, are women of color. Women of color constitute 1.3% of the total 315 statewide elective executives.

STATE LEGISLATORS — 348 (323D, 25R)

Of the 1,732 women state legislators serving nationwide, 348 or 20.1% are women of color. They include 94 senators and 254 representatives; 323 are Democrats and 25 are Republicans. Women of color constitute 4.7% of the total 7,382 state legislators.

African American women hold 232 (229D, 3R) seats in state legislatures. They include 62 senators and 170 representatives serving in 39 states.

Asian American/Pacific Islander women hold 30 (22D, 8R) seats in state legislatures. They include 7 senators and 23 representatives serving in 9 states (CA, HI, IA, MD, MN, NV, NY, SC, WA).

Latinas hold 72 (60D, 12R) seats in state legislatures. They include 20 senators and 52 representatives serving in 22 states (AZ, CA, CO, CT, FL, ID, IL, IN, KS, MA, MD, MN, NC, NH, NJ, NM, NY, OH, RI, SC, TX, WA)

Native American women hold 14 (12D, 2R) seats in state legislatures. They include 5 senators and 9 representatives in 10 states (AK, CO, ID, MT, NM, ND, OK, SD, VT, WA).

The only woman of color to serve in the U.S. Senate to date is Carol Moseley Braun (D-IL), an African American who was elected in 1992 and served from 1993-1999.
