

THE GENDER GAP

Party Identification and Presidential Performance Ratings

The "gender gap" refers to differences between women and men in political attitudes and voting choices. A gender gap has been apparent in both party identification and evaluations of the performances of recent presidents.

PARTY IDENTIFICATION

A gender gap in party identification has been evident since the early 1980s. Larger proportions of women than men are Democrats.

PRESIDENTIAL PERFORMANCE RATINGS

A gender gap also is evident in ratings of presidential performance. In general, women are less likely than men to evaluate favorably the job performance of Republican presidents, and women are more likely than men to evaluate favorably the job performance of Democratic Presidents.

Women generally have been less likely than men to approve of the way recent Republican Presidents (George W. Bush, George H.W. Bush, Ronald Reagan) have handled their job as President.
