WOMEN IN THE U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 2001

In 2001, 60 women hold seats in the House of Representatives, comprising 13.8% of the 435 members. The women represent 27 states (the first time that more than half the states have women in the House); 42 are Democrats and 18 are Republicans. The congresswomen include 20 women of color: 13 African American women, 6 Latinas, and 1 Asian American/Pacific Islander woman. In addition, there are two Democratic women delegates, a Caribbean American, representing the Virgin Islands, and an African American from the District of Columbia.

Of the 56 women who served in the House in 2000, 4 did not seek re-election. All 52 (37D, 15R) who sought re-election won. In addition, seven new women (4D, 3R) were elected.

Of the 60 women who serve in the House in 2001, 53 first entered by winning regular general elections. Eight others won special elections; Bono (CA), Capps (CA), Lee (CA), Millender-McDonald (CA), Pelosi (CA), Ros-Lehtinen (FL), Watson (CA), and Wilson (NM) succeeded others who died or resigned. In addition, Mink (HI) first entered the House in a regular election, serving twelve years; when she returned after a thirteen-year break, it was as the winner of a special election. Clayton (NC) and Emerson (MO) won regular elections simultaneously with special elections to fill vacancies. The DC and VI Delegates won regular general elections.

Prior to entering Congress, 45, or 75%, of the 60 women lawmakers held previous elective offices; 17 of the 41 held more than one post. The positions include: state legislator (34); county governing board member (6); mayor/council member (15); municipal judge (4); school board member (4).
